

Sunday, October 24, 2010: Blessed are the Meek

Scripture: Isaiah 11:1-10; Matthew 5:5

Sermon Notes:

1. Our culture seeks unbridled power, power for its own sake.

- 2. Domination replaces Godly dominion where a sadistic urge warps the biblical mandate to rule over the earth.
- 3. In Isaiah 11 we read about the power of the Messiah King, giving us of a vision of righteousness and peace under a reign of liberty and truth.
- 4. Through the Early Church, the message of the compassion of God in Christ moves into a Roman world dominated by the lust for power.
- God sends a bridled army of the mighty meek into the earth to do His work.
- 6. Meekness has connotations today which are not biblical. Biblically, meekness is not weakness, but a lack of pretense, a lack of pride.
- 7. The world's idea of inheriting the earth is to assert yourself, to be self-assured use forcefulness, violence and power to foist your agenda on others.
- 8. Abraham willingly surrendered to God's call in his life.
- 9. Moses was described as the meekest man on the earth.
- 10. David was meek, allowing God's purposes and timing to prevail.
- 11. Paul described himself as the least of the apostles.
- 12. Jesus submitted Himself of His own accord to humiliation and death. Jesus didn't rail against accusation or demand His rights.
- 13. The Meek are the strong in the Lord, broken by God to be harnessed for God's use. Meekness is the opposite of unbridled anger.
- 14. Meekness is an unnatural attribute wrought by the Spirit of God.
- 15. Yet meekness does not mean 'never be angry'. The Spirit of the Lord in Scripture makes people angry. Saul was moved to Godly

- anger before battle; the Spirit of the Lord came upon Sampson; the Spirit of the Lord came upon Jesus when He cleansed the temple.
- 16. Meekness is a virtue born of strength of character. It is those tamed by God who will inherit the earth.
- 17. The meek person doesn't wallow in self-pity. They're not overly sensitive about themselves. No one can harm you in any way.
- 18. If you're already down, humble before the Lord, then you can leave your reputation before the Lord.
- 19. The meek are not obsessed with defending themselves. God has the appropriate means and timing to bring about justice.
- 20. In Jesus all things are ours we inherit all things (Romans 8:32, 1 Corinthians 3:21).
- 21. In surrendering to Christ, we're continually satisfied in God.
- 22. All things are ours in Christ. As the Puritans said, we're to assert the crown rights of King Jesus.

- 1. What is meekness according to the Bible? Give examples.
- 2. Am I compliant with the calling of the saints to be broken, harnessed, usable to God in His government?
- 3. How does a Christian show wisdom according to James 3:13-18?
- 4. How do I respond if another person tells me I'm proud, arrogant?
- 5. Has the Lord worked in me so I can rejoice in accomplishing great things, but I'm equally glad if another has accomplished the same thing?
- 6. Do I wallow in self-pity absorbed with self-consciousness?
- 7. Am I always jumping to my own defense? Am I absorbed primarily with pleasing others?
- 8. What does Matthew 5:5 mean by "inherit the earth"?
- What kind of strength is required by the meek in 1 Corinthians 6;1-5?
- 10. What does it mean to assert the crown rights of King Jesus?
